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

Technology class introduces essential skills and digital citizenship.


Art

Speech & Language Therapy



Our fully integrative approach focuses on enhancing students' independence, fine and gross motor skills, and sensory regulation through close collaboration with occupational and physical therapists.


Nurse

Dedicated sensory rooms, guided by Occupational Therapists, provide strategies to address students' unique sensory needs.
















Preschool, Elementary, Middle School

The Union Campus provides a well-rounded program for students in Preschool, Elementary School, and Middle School. With small class sizes and a high staff-to-student ratio, we ensure individual attention and active participation. Our collaborative teaching model excels in serving students with autism and various disabilities.











Middle School, High School

The Montclair Campus provides a robust curriculum aligned with NJSLS. Small class sizes guarantee individual attention. Students receive academic instruction and explore subjects like Art, Music, Gym, Technology, and Family and Consumer Science.

Transition Program (Bridge)

We offer a post high school experience focusing on independent living, employment preparation, as well as further educational opportunities.

Work Based Learning (WBL)

Our students participate in WBL experiences that place them in the community in order to develop essential skills for future employment.









Admissions Process

Applicants are accepted throughout the school year.

Student Eligibility

The Deron School serves students eligible for Special Education or Related Services (ESERS). Our Multiple Disabled Program caters to various disabilities, including Autism. Public school districts make referrals. Join our monthly Open Houses for facility tours and program details.

Intake/Visit

We request reports, including IEP and medical information, for an intake. If suitable, an intake is arranged for a joint decision on placement.

Acceptance

A joint decision will be made by Deron personnel, district, and family based on the intake, evaluations, and reports to determine if the placement is appropriate.

Parental Rights

New Jersey Administrative code for special education (N.J.A.C. 6A:14) and the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004 (IDEA 2004) are laws that ensure children with disabilities have a free, appropriate education in the least restrictive environment. An important part of these laws provides parents with the right to participate in their children's education.

If you think that your child has a disability, you have the right to:

- Have your child evaluated, free of charge by your school district
- See the results of these evaluations and all of your child's school records
- Ask your school district to review and consider the reports of individuals outside of the district who have evaluated your child
- Receive written notice of the district's decision about your child's disability and the reason for this decision

If your child has a disability, you are entitled to the following:

- A free, appropriate public education for your child (also known as FAPE)
- Have your child educated to the maximum extent appropriate in the general education setting and curricula
- An Individualized Education Program (IEP) created for your child, where you are a member of the IEP Team

The Parental Rights in Education (PRISE) publication will be offered to you at every IEP meeting.
